# Tips for keeping your pet safe and sane this Holloween



Halloween is so darned fun, for us humans, that is. Think about it from the perspective of your pets. The ridiculous costumes they are forced to wear, all those scary sights and sounds, the doorbell ringing over and over again. For our dogs and cats, Halloween can be downright ghoulish! Had they a say so in the matter, most of them would opt to ignore this holiday altogether! If celebration is a must in your household, consider the following tips to keep your pets safe and sane this Halloween season.

#### Your Pet's Physical Well Being

Guard the candy bowl! Given the opportunity, most dogs will gladly gorge on chocolate, wrappers and all. Chocolate contains theobromine a substance chemically related to caffeine and capable of causing the "cocoa jitters." The richer (darker) the chocolate, the more jittery your pup will be. Symptoms of chocolate toxicity include restlessness, irritability, increased urination, muscle tremors, and sometimes even seizures. Vomiting and diarrhea are also commonplace following chocolate ingestion. If you suspect your dog(s) has raided the candy bowl, call your family veterinarian or local emergency clinic immediately. The sooner treatment is initiated, the better the chance for a good outcome. Based on the approximate weight of your candy thief and the type and amount of chocolate ingested, you will be advised whether or not your dog needs medical attention. Likely no big deal for the Great Dane who has downed some milk chocolate kisses. For the four pound Chihuahua, however, a few ounces of bittersweet chocolate could be a lethal dose.

If you welcome trick-or-treaters to your home, your front door will be opening and closing repeatedly. This translates into many opportunities for your dog or cat to escape into the dark of night when their familiar territory has become particularly spooky. Getting lost or running out in front of a moving vehicle are potentially disastrous holiday outcomes. My advice- don't include your pets as part of your Halloween welcoming committee. Far safer to confine them behind closed doors.

# Tips for keeping your pet safe and sane this Holloween

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#### Your Pet's Emotional Well Being

Does your kitty hide under your bed every time someone new comes to your home? Does your dog's job description include barking and protecting whenever a stranger (trick-or-treaters included) arrives at your front door? Think about how these poor animals must feel on Halloween night when that doorbell rings dozens of times within just a few hours. Talk about emotional exhaustion! Consider the following options to preserve their sanity:

- Confine your pets behind closed doors, ideally in a sound-proof part of your home.
- Provide trick-or-treaters with a "help yourself" candy bowl on your front walkway.
- Board your pets elsewhere on Halloween night.
- Turn off your house lights and skip the holiday altogether. (No guarantees your house won't be egged the following day!)

Halloween costumes for pets certainly make for some giggles and terrific photo opportunities. But how do our pets really feel about being dressed in those silly outfits? I once made the mistake of hosting a Halloween pet costume contest via my <u>blog</u>. Leave it to my wonderful readers to set me straight. They let me know in no uncertain terms that our pets prefer to dress in their "**birthday suits**" for Halloween!



There is likely nothing your dog enjoys more than accompanying you for a walk around your neighborhood. Doing so on Halloween, however, may be a downright spooky experience for your best buddy. My bottom line advice- Halloween is a holiday for humans. Let's leave our pets out of it!



How he loved the attention and after two years he reached a normal weight of 86 pounds. He was never completely mobile because of his impaired back legs but we don't think he noticed. The important thing was he could interact with

all of his dog and people friends and then come home to his couch. We are so grateful that he was able to spend his last days doing just that. The picture shows him at a park friend's birthday party just four days before he passed at 11 ½. Thanks to the wonderful caregivers at Evergreen Golden Rescue we had six years with our beautiful boy. ## Rainbow Bridge



**Boomer - Roger** Campbell (2009) Boomer joined us shortly after my divorce while I was still trying to adapt to weekends only with my kids and an empty home during the week. When the kids were here, he treated each of them differently staying close to the one for whom that mattered and periodically making his presence known to the one who preferred that type of interaction. When I was home alone he'd sleep in my room at night. If the kids were here, he'd sleep in the hallway between us and check on each of us periodically. While I worked in the home office, Boomer laid on a bed behind me occasionally nudging me with his nose when he wanted a bit of attention. Sometimes he couldn't help himself and threw his head in the lap of whomever he was feeling closest to. We called it "getting a hug". Everyone who met him loved him on sight and the feeling was always returned. When I traveled, Boomer never lacked for volunteer caretakers. He was such an old and gentle soul. When his cancer got the best of him he gave us the signs we needed to make the tough choice without guilt or regret, but with love and sorrow. I don't know if the perfect dog exists, but if he does, for our family, it was Boomer.

Jasper - Rachelle Cutter and Dan Kelleher (2012) Three and a half years ago we contacted EGRR looking to adopt an older dog for our older dog who had just lost her sister. They suggested Jasper, a 7 1/2 year old who was with Roy and Linda at the time in foster care. Jasper has since been the light of my life. The girl dog with the boy name (we never changed it) had the biggest heart on the planet. When Copper the original older dog went to the Rainbow Bridge we signed up again at EGRR and this amazing group brought us Lily (Hazel at the time). Jasper and Lily have been inseparable since the day they met. Through trips to the



park and swims on the beach, to car rides and wrestle sessions they adored each other and we adored Jasper. She was diagnosed with multiple myeloma in October 2014 and put up an amazing fight for 10 months having a wonderful quality of life until the chemo stopped working and we could do no more. Thank you EGRR for the great gift of Jasper. My life is forever enriched having had her as a daughter .

Rusty – Cindy Johnson (2013) I'll never know what happened to Rusty before he came to me. I only know that whatever it was, he deserved so much better. I sought him out because I wanted comfort, but sometimes the journey we plan is not the journey we end up getting. Being a partner to Rusty required me to look beyond what I wanted and to try to see the world from his point of view. Rusty didn't have perfect Golden Retriever conformation and disposition. He was long in places where he should have been short, and short in places here he should have been long. He was anxious and fearful at times when most goldens would be relaxed and content, and at times when he should have been social he



would just need to crawl into a small corner and take a break from the world. But when he saw me, he would look at me with such devotion and appreciation. I knew I mattered to him more than anything in the world. He made me feel whole and important at times when the craziness of life had left me feeling exhausted and empty. We did that for each other. We miss him more than words can express and we'll carry him in our hearts forever.



Jackson – Betsy Robinson (2009) Jackson was such a welcome surprise in our lives. Having owned a Golden before, we thought we were familiar with the breed, but just like people, each has their own unique personality. When we went to meet Jackson at the EGRR foster home, he bounded out of his kennel and puddled in my lap. This was the sign it was meant to be. He was my running buddy, my husband's alarm clock and the most patient dog you could ask for. We miss him every day and I know that while we strived to make his life as happy as possible, he made ours even more so. Thanks, EGRR – the work you do is SO important. Don't forget that!


Apparently sharing the bed is OK in this house.

She had surgery to repair a knee injury & did well with the subsequent limited mobility that was required after the surgery and for many weeks. Her foster family has decided that she should continue to stay with them permanently.

Jordan Age 7 year old spayed female came into rescue from a Boise, Idaho shelter through a volunteer who frequently visits that area. They transported Jordan to a foster home in Silverdale. Jordan is a big girl with a strong prey drive. She now has 10 fenced acres to run and chase whatever she wants plus a younger brother to play with and an older brother who ignores her. Her new Mom started Jordan in obedience class the day after she arrived and she reports that Jordan is the star of the class.

Boston Age 2.5 year old neutered male was listed with rescue as being incompatible with the other house dog & that he was rather high energy for the young child in the home. Boston became the companion of another golden in his foster home that tolerated his high energy. His foster family humans worked with him expecting that he would learn some manners & control some of his exuberance. He did need some vetting due to a rash that was treated & cleared up easily. Boston is now a permanent member of his foster home.
